Answering Svc Six (7) shifts are still vacant. Two of these are overnight shifts (Fri and Sat). New volunteers are invited to fill the remaining vacancies. We encourage interested AA's to contact us by email (website) or by phone to get the most up-to-date information about open shifts.

With 33 of 56 shifts reporting (40, incl. vacant), our volunteers fielded 284 calls during May, making the average number of calls per reporting shift approx. 9, with a low number of 1 and a high of 20. At present, three (3) shifts are covered by AA groups, as "group commitments".

What Service Means to Me

My name is Paulie and I am a recovered alcoholic. One of my service commitments is being the Chair of the Public Information committee for South Jersey Intergroup.

One of the ongoing service commitments of this committee is to go to area High Schools to speak to the students about alcohol abuse. I try to show them by example, and to tell them how full and wonderful life can be without abusing alcohol. We try to tel them simply about our program and the steps we take to not only remain sober but to lead useful, productive, happy lives. We share our experience, strength and hope by telling the student what we were like, what happened and what we are like now.

After speaking at a High School recently, during health class, the teacher suggested the student write thank you letters to my group for coming to their school. The responses we received were overwhelming! They thanked us for taking the time to come and speak to them, and some even commented they were inspired by our stories, showing them that they can overcome difficult problems in life without alcohol and other substances.

Some said it reconfirmed their ideas about not drinking or using drugs. It feels so good to know that this service can make a difference in a teen's life. To know that your time and effort could possibly help someone makes it all worthwhile. And to think I thought they weren't even listening!

In closing I am grateful that I can do this service. Any type of service is good, but for me this is very rewarding. I have never felt bad after doing service, especially when going to schools. My service is also helping me stay sober one day at a time.

I would also like to thank Samantha, Zack and Becca for their continued service. I feel the message really hits home with these young people sharing in the schools. They are people the students can identify with.
